5. PROJECT OBJECTIVES

I) Execution of local and Special Laws:-

It has been observed that the implementation of local and special laws isn't being done in an effective manner. As a result, people are facing a lot of issues. Even this practice has badly affected the writ of the state as well as damaged the perception of good governance amongst the general public over the years. This authority will ensure the execution of local and special laws in an irresistible way.

II) Ensuring Price Control:

It has become common practice to increase prices by the shopkeepers and other stakeholders without any reason. This activity gives rise to hyperinflation resulting in deteriorated living conditions of the common man as it adds to their financial liabilities as well as burden. This authority will ensure the provision of commodities etc. at the Government rates and hence, resulting in controlled prices.

III) Eviction of State Land:-

It has been observed that thousands of acres of land of the government are under the control of the 'Land Mafia'. The utilization of the said land can add to the provincial as well as national exchequer. To release this land from the control of the said mafia, this authority would play an effective role.

IV) Counter Hoarding Practices:-

Hoarding practices are quite common nowadays. This activity results in a shortage of necessary commodities resulting in hyper-inflation. To counter hoarding practices is also one of the fundamental objectives of this authority.

V) Removal of Public Nuisance:-

Any person aggrieved by the public nuisance directly or indirectly or perceives to be aggrieved due to such nuisance in near future may submit a complaint to the Enforcement Officer, Sub Divisional Enforcement

Officer, Hearing Officer, Board or the Authority.

Any Department, Whistle-blower or any employee may also report public nuisance to the Enforcement Officer, Sub Divisional Enforcement Officer, Hearing Officer, Board or the Authority.

VI) Facilitating Public:-

The effective implementation of laws will facilitate public at large. It would rebuild the trust of the common man on the law.

6. DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION OF PROJECT

6.1 JUSTIFICATION OF PROJECT:

Effective implementation of government policies and laws is the cornerstone of good governance and societal well-being. It allows policymakers to achieve desired goals and results particularly when addressing complex challenges. In this regard, the formation of PERA has been proposed.

The effectiveness of the implementation of government policies in general and local and special laws, in particular, is on the decline with the passage of time. This has seriously affected the writ of the state as well as damaged the perception of good governance amongst the general public over the years. The population is increasing at a swift pace which gave rise to issues such as weak execution of local and special laws, gaps in enforcement mechanisms, low conviction ratio, and poor implementation of local and special laws owing to the scarcity of human resources, absence of proper trainings and inability to use modern methods/gadgets for recording evidence. This situation has necessitated the need for taking special measures to address the prevailing issues for establishing writ of the state and ensuring good governance in the province. Indeed, this project would ensure the implementation of laws in an effective manner, ensure a price control system, eliminate the practices of eviction of state land from the 'Land Mafia', and stop the practices of hoarding by using strict enforcement of the law. In a nutshell, this authority would set the golden principles of good governance by ensuring the implementation of law, provision of justice, and countering corrupt practices with iron hands. Further, the lack of quality human resources is also one of the major problems in the province, this authority would add to human resources at Tehsil, District, Division, and Provincial level which would result in setting unusual examples and patterns of good governance. It would, indeed, put the province on the corridors of unfathomable glory and success.

District Enforcement and Regulatory Board:

• The Authority may, by an order, constitute the District Enforcement and Regulatory Board at the district level with following composition:

Establishment of Enforcement Stations:-

- The Government shall, by notification, establish or declare any place or premises, not including a police station, generally or specially, to be an Enforcement Station for the purposes of the Act.
- There may be one or more Enforcement Stations for each Sub-pision having such territorial jurisdiction as may be specified by the Government.
- Each Enforcement Station shall consist of:
- a. one Sub Divisional Enforcement Officer
- b. Enforcement officer
- C. Investigation Officers
- d. Sergeants and
- e. Support Staff
- The Authority may also appoint such additional persons at each Enforcement Station as may be required for carrying out the purposes of the Act, in such manner and on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed.

- The employees of Enforcement Stations shall wear such uniform, carry such weapons and shall display such identification cards or badges with their uniform as may be prescribed.
- Each Enforcement Station shall be provided marked vehicles and motorbikes.
- The Authority may frame regulations for supervision and administration of Enforcement Stations and its employees.

After approval of the Act (*ibid*), Director General, Punjab Enforcement & Regularity Authority (PERA) requested I&C Wing, S&GAD to solicit permission of the Chief Minister, Punjab to place the proposed mechanism for establishment of Enforcement Stations (ESs) of PERA before the Provincial Cabinet. He submitted that as per approval granted by the Authority in its first meeting held under the chairpersonship of the Honorable Chief Minister, Punjab on 02.12.2024, initially, 154 Enforcement Stations of the PERA are to be established across Punjab (one in each Tehsil). A scheme titled "Civic Enforcement Centers in Punjab" at a total cost of Rs.4.5 billion along with allocation of Rs.1.000 billion appearing at GS No.3453 is already included in ADP 2024-25.

Initially, the plan was to set up as many Enforcement Stations as possible in existing government buildings, identified by district administrations for each tehsil, and for remaining construct new ones. Based on field visits, stakeholder meetings and technical scrutiny in collaboration with C&W Department, PERA proposed the following mechanism for creation of Enforcement Stations in 154 Tehsils of Punjab:

- 1. Converting 8 existing buildings into permanent ESs through M&R as agreed by C&W Department amounting to Rs.0.384 billion.
- 2. Converting 26 existing buildings into permanent ESs, as identified by the concerned District Administration by adding the scope in the current ADP scheme No. 3453 with a tentative cost of Rs.1.384 billion
- -Construction of 120 new ESs in the remaining Tehsils of Punjab in two phases:
- 1. Phase 1. Creation of new ESs in 85 Tehsils of Punjab by changing nomenclature of the current development scheme No. 3453 with an approximate cost of Rs.8.593 billion, as per the estimates provided by C&W Department
- 2. Phase 2. Creation of new ESs in the remaining 35 Tehsils of Punjab in Next Financial Year through a new ADP scheme.

The Provincial Cabinet in its meeting held on 11.02.2025, considered and approved the following proposal, with the direction that the requisite funds would be provided through inter/intra sectoral re-appropriation within the Development portfolio of the ADP 2024-25 by the P&D Board:

"Change of nomenclature of the development scheme reflected in the ADP 2024-25 at GS No.3453 from "Civic Enforcement Centers in Punjab" to "Establishment of Enforcement Stations of PERA in Punjab (New Construction / Rehabilitation of existing government buildings) along with enhancement of the cost from Rs.4.5 billion to Rs.9.977 billion)

Deputy Commissioners identified the atleast 2 Kanal Government Land for the said purpose. After identification of sites, C&W Department being executive agency prepared design and Layout Plan for the subject scheme. Prototype Design & Layout Plan devised by C&W Department (Designed attached with PC-I). C&W Department was also requested to furnish Rough Cost Estimates for construction of the said offices under their jurisdiction.

After approval of the Provincial Cabinet, C&W Department furnished rough cost estimates amounting to **Rs.9,593.854 million** duly vetted by Chief Engineers concerned of C&W Department and requested for placing the case before the PDWP being relevant competent forum for consideration / approval. It is evident that no foreign funding is involved in this regard and the project is purely financed by the Govt. of the Punjab. Furthermore, it will immensely benefit the state in economic terms by :

- I) Controlling inflation by carrying out hoarding practices and ensuring government devised rates in the market.
- II) Eviction of state land will add to billions of PKR in revenue generation for the state.

11.4 FINANCIAL ANALYSIS:

One of the primary objectives of the project is to ensure eviction of state land which can add to national exchequer in billions of rupees. Right now, land worth billions of rupees is under the control of land mafia in the province. For example,

Drive against 'Qabza Mafia' on the direction of SMBR indicated that 188,000 state lands worth Rs. 472.38 billion were retrieved(Dawn Report published in Nov. 2021).

Still the state land worth Billions of Rs. is under the contorl of land mafia which will be evicted after ensuring functionlaity of PERA in letter and spirit.

Hoarding leads to inflation which further deteriorates economic situation in the state.













